Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE SAN JOAQUIN FAIR AT STOCKTON FROM JUNE 11, 2003 THROUGH JUNE 22, 2003.

San Joaquin Fair filed its application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting at Stockton:

- June 11 through June 22, 2003, or 10 days, the same as 2002. The fair proposes to race a total of 104 races, the same as 2002.

- Racing 5 days per week, Wednesday through Sunday, with 10 races per day the first week. The second week will have 10 races per day Wednesday through Friday and 12 on Saturday and Sunday.
 - Number of horses available will determine the number of races programmed daily for each breed.
 - No racing Monday, June 16 and Tuesday, June 17.
 - June 11 through 15 the fair will race concurrently with Bay Meadows.
- First post 12:45 p.m. daily and 3:15 p.m. on Fridays.
 - During the overlap with Bay Meadows the post time will move up seven minutes and/or be adjusted to accommodate multiple signals.
- Specific changes from the 2002 license application:
 - Robert Mooneyhan replaces Hugh Morgan as starter.
 - Offering a \$2 pick 6 on the last 6 thoroughbred races.
 - General parking increased from \$3 to \$5 and preferred parking from \$5 to \$7.
- Request Darrell Sparks be appointed horse identifier pursuant to CHRB Rule 1525.
- Track safety requirements have been fulfilled.
- Wagering program will use CHRB rules.
 - Request the option of a \$1.00 wager on all exactas and trifectas.
 - Early wagering will not be offered.

- Simulcasting conducted with other out-of-state racing jurisdictions pursuant to Business and Professions Code Section 19602; and with authorized locations throughout California.
- Inspection of backstretch worker housing completed.

NOTICE TO APPLICANT All funds generated and retained from on-track pari-mutuel handle which are obligated by law for distribution in the form of purses, breeders' awards or other benefits to horsemen, **shall not** be deemed as income to the fair and **shall**, within 3 calendar days following receipt, be deposited in a segregated and separate liability account in a depository approved by the CHRB and shall be at the disposition of the Paymaster of Purses, who shall pay or distribute such funds to the persons entitled thereto. All funds generated from off-track simulcast wagering, interstate wagering, and out-of-state wagering which are obligated by law for distribution in the form of purses and breeders' awards, shall also be deposited within 3 calendar days following receipt into such liability account. In the event the fair is obligated to the payment of purses prior to those obligated amounts being retained from pari-mutuel wagering for such purpose, or as a result of overpayment of earned purses at the conclusion of the meeting, the fair shall transfer from its own funds such amounts as are necessary for the Paymaster of Purses to distribute to the horse owners statutorily or contractually entitled thereto. The fair is entitled thereafter to recover such transferred funds from the Paymaster of Purses' account; and if insufficient funds remain in the account at the conclusion of the meeting, the fair is entitled to carry forward the deficit to its next succeeding meeting as provided by B&P Code Section 19615(c) or (d). In the event of **underpayment** of purses which results in a balance remaining in the Paymaster of Purses' account at the conclusion of the meeting after distribution of amounts due to horsemen and breeders and horsemen's organizations, the fair may carry forward the surplus amount to its next succeeding meeting; provided, however, that the amount so retained does not exceed an amount equivalent to the average daily distribution of purses and breeders' awards during the meeting. 

STAFF ANALYSIS REQUEST TO UTILIZE ARCI RULES ON BREEDERS' CUP DAY

**REGULAR BOARD MEETING
APRIL 24, 2003**

Background:

The Oak Tree Racing Association will host the Breeders' Cup World Thoroughbred Championships this October 25, 2003. The Breeders' Cup has been working with Oak Tree to arrange the many details that must be implemented to create a successful program on that day. Two items have been forwarded from Oak Tree regarding the prior approval of ARCI rules. Current Horse Racing Law allows the Board to approve the use of ARCI Pari-mutuel rules in addition to its own rules. The two items before you today are the ARCI Future Wager and the Match Rival Rule.

The Future Wager is currently in use in California with regard to the Kentucky Derby. If the Board approves this request, a Breeders' Cup Future Wager will be created for the time periods outlined in the attached letter.

In addition, approval for the ARCI Match Rival rule is being requested. The Match Rival rule is the rule used to offer the Head2Head wager that was featured for the first time at last year's Breeders' Cup. Using this rule, Oak Tree and the Breeders' Cup will offer an additional pool for wagering in selected races. This wager will consist of two high profile runners in the selected race and the object of the wager will be to determine which of these two runners will finish first.

The purpose of this item today is that Breeders' Cup plans for these matters months ahead of time. Although these items will be included in Oak Tree's application for license, Breeders' Cup is asking for Board approval today so that they can be assured that their marketing and operational plans can move forward now.

Ken Kirchner of the Breeders' Cup staff will be in attendance at this meeting to answer any questions that the Board may have with regard to these matters.

3. ARCI Model Rules of Flat Racing; Uncoupled Entries. Request approval to offer uncoupled entries on all Breeders' Cup World Thoroughbred Championship races.

**STAFF ANALYSIS
REQUEST TO SUSPEND TWO CHRB RULES
ON BREEDERS' CUP DAY**

**REGULAR BOARD MEETING
APRIL 24, 2003**

Background:

This item is also in anticipation of the Breeders' Cup World Thoroughbred Championships this October 25. The Breeders' Cup is concerned about two CHRB rules: Rule 1606 – Coupling of Horses and Rule 1691 – Colors, Numbers, and Advertising.

In the first case, they request that the Breeders' Cup races be run without regard to the coupling rule, i.e., they request that the Board suspend Rule 1606 for those races. Rule 1606 currently requires the coupling of runners for wagering purposes when there is common ownership of the runners. The rule has been suspended for prior Breeders' Cup events held in California and did not create any problems or obstacles.

In the second case regarding advertising the attached memo from the Breeders' Cup indicates that they wish to amend Rule 1691 so that the portions of the rule relating to advertising would not be applicable to Breeders' Cup races. Although this approach would work, there may not be enough time to successfully amend the rule. The more practical approach would be to simply suspend the rule for the Breeders' Cup races on October 25.

Once again, Mr. Kirchner can respond to any questions the Board may have about this item.

Recommendation:

The staff recommends that the Board approve the suspension of these two rules for the 2003 Breeders' Cup.

ARTICLE 8. RUNNING THE RACE

4 CCR 1691 (2003)

§ 1691. Colors, Number, and Advertising

(a) A jockey shall be properly attired for riding in a race, wearing the colors of the owner of the horse he or she is riding, and exhibiting a number on the saddlecloth that corresponds to the number of the horse on the official program.

(b) Advertising, including logos, labels, or product endorsements shall be permitted on jockey attire, owner silks, and track saddlecloths from the point of weighing out for a race to weighing in after its conclusion.

(c) A copy of the advertisement signage must be submitted for review, for compliance with the provisions of this rule, to the stewards at the track where the advertisement will be worn before the horse is entered to race.

(d) Advertisement on jockey clothing is limited to:

(1) A maximum of 32 square inches on each thigh of the pants on the outer sides between the hip and knee and 10 square inches on the rear at the base of the spine.

(2) A maximum of 24 square inches on boots and leggings on the outside of each nearest the top of the boot.

(3) A maximum of 6 square inches on the front center in the neck area.

(e) Advertisement on owner silks is limited to:

(1) A maximum of 32 square inches on the chest area.

(2) A maximum of 1.5 inches by 4 inches on each collar.

(f) Advertisement on track saddlecloths is not limited to size or placement.

DISCUSSION REGARDING ADVERTISEMENTS
FOR OUT-OF-STATE AND OFFSHORE WAGERING SITES**

**REGULAR BOARD MEETING

Background:

It has been noted in recent years that industry publications in California carry advertisements for out-of-state and offshore wagering sites. Since wagering via these sites by Californians has been deemed illegal by CHRB counsel and others, it has been suggested that the various media outlets that carry these ads should be required to stop advertising these illegal activities, especially within the borders of California. The publication most often mentioned in these discussions is the Daily Racing Form (DRF). Charles Hayward of the DRF has responded to these concerns in a letter included with this item. In conversations with CHRB representatives, Mr. Hayward has offered to insert the phrase "Restricted to those jurisdictions where permitted by law" in all such ads in an effort to address the concerns of the CHRB. Mr. Hayward will be at the Board meeting to address this matter.

Dear John,

I hope that this letter finds you well, and I apologize for the delay in getting back to you.

Regarding the plans on the website, the pricing tries to encourage people to order more cards over a longer period of time. In addition, we have to be sensitive to cannibalization of the daily paper. We do have a new annual plan which is 120 race cards for \$189.95, which would give you unlimited access to News and Charts. We also have an annual plan for News Only (no PP's) for \$99.95. A summary of all of the online plans is available under "Purchase DRF Online Past Performance." I hope that this is helpful.

When we spoke at Santa Anita, you mentioned the concern regarding proper identification on geldings in past performance lines. We are working with The Jockey Club and various racing offices to eliminate the inconsistencies and problems. I hope to have specific details to report when I next see you.

The second subject you inquired about was advertisements for off shore wagering sites in the Daily Racing Form. First, there are two clear categories of off shore sports books; there are the ones that bet into the pools by paying for a simulcast rate and handle large volumes of wagers such as RGS in St. Kitts, which handled over \$500 million in 2002. This high volume site rebates up to 10% for high volume customers. These rebates are of some concern to some industry organizations as you know, but these sites are generally not Daily Racing Form advertising customers. The second group of off shores does not bet directly into the pools and put severe limitations of maximum payouts that eliminate any serious player from betting into their pools. There is also some anecdotal evidence that if these smaller off shores handle get a large horseracing wager, they will lay it off in a co-mingled pool.

Before proceeding, it should be noted that there has been the suggestion that the off shore advertising in DRF is illegal. This is not true. Our lawyer firmly believes that under commercial first amendment rights, we have the legal right to run these sports book advertisements. I would be happy to have our lawyer discuss our position with anyone you would designate.

In my discussions with Roger Licht, Mike Marten and Roy Wood, I did agree to consider putting some cautionary language in off shore ads. I recently submitted that language to Roy and will be following up with him.

I have attached a summary sheet which details how much our advertisers handle in total sports bets, how much they handle on horseracing and what maximum payouts they place on horse wagers.

Clearly the greatest concern we all have is whether these off shores are siphoning off significant money from the industry. I would strongly suggest that this group of off shores is not. These four sports books generated over 90% of our sports book advertising revenues of \$500,000 in 2002. In total, I believe they generated less than \$20 million for the entire year, which is the equivalent of one day of all source handle on a Saratoga weekend day.

Why all the advertising for such little handle? These books want our customers for their sports betting. SBG, our largest advertiser, limits all bets, straight and exotics on horses to a maximum of 50-1 return. I do not believe that any serious horse player would bet on those terms, and I believe that any research you do would confirm that. In addition, if SBG were to get a straight bet wager of less than 50-1, we have anecdotal evidence that they lay off this type of action with books that are betting into the pool.

If all \$20 million that is handled by non co-mingled sports books was subject to the traditional 3% simulcast fee, the total loss to the industry for the year 2002 was \$600,000. However, I would suggest the number is actually substantially less than that for two reasons: (1) as mentioned above, larger wagers find their way into a co-mingled pool where a simulcast fee is paid, and (2) a significant amount of money is bet by sports bettors that are not horseplayers, but are looking for some action.

John, if I truly thought that Daily Racing Form was encouraging a significant drain of revenues paid to purses and racetracks, we would stop taking these ads. However, our research does not bear this out and it would be a breach of my responsibility to our owners if I stopped accepting advertising that was not having a material effect on the industry.

I do believe that the more discussion that we have on this topic, the better it is for the understanding of all industry stakeholders. At the suggestion of Roger and Roy, I am planning to attend the next CHRB meeting at Hollywood Park on April 24th to discuss this issue.

I hope that this letter is helpful and I look forward to discussing this with you in more detail.

APRIL 24, 2003****Background:**

For the past fifteen years the California racing industry has tried to expand the target audience for their racing product. In the mid-eighties and into the early nineties the expansion of the off-track wagering sites was the priority. In the early nineties the export of the California signals was implemented to widen the access to the California product. The late nineties brought an expansion of the import of racing signals from out-of-state racing venues to the California patrons. And finally in 2002 the arrival of account wagering via telephone and the internet.

The attached charts and schedules of annual parimutuel data show the composition of the handle since 1990. The charts show the relative composition of the handle as the game changed from 1990 to the present. The steady decline of the California average daily ontrack handle and attendance (Chart 1) is unmistakable (although not unexpected) as is the rise of the interstate handle as compared to the California ontrack and offtrack handles (Chart 2). The 2002 California handle includes the new ADW handle (Chart 1, total CA handle).

And last but not least, through March 31, 2003, the total ADW handle from inception is \$239 million which represents about 8% of the total California handle. Although ADW is off to a fair start, Chart 1 shows that the trends in place prior to ADW have not been affected, either positively or negatively, by the first year of account wagering.



CALIFORNIA AVERAGE DAILY HANDLE & ATTENDANCE





CHART 2
